Reception

Once upon a time, Reception began exploring traditional tales. This week, we have had lots of fun reading. 'The Gingerbread Man'. We talked about the different characters in the story and the problem that the Gingerbread Man faced - how would he cross the river without getting too soggy? Reception talked about the importance of not trusting strangers, as they may not be a very kind friend. We wrote our own labels and had a go at writing the Gingerbread Man's favourite phrase. In maths, the children used the numicon to help develop their skills of identifying number bonds to 5. We have <u>loved</u> watching the building work happening in our outdoor area and we can't wait to explore this exciting new space next week!

<u>Year 2</u>

Year 2 have had another busy and productive week in school. In maths, we have started our work on fractions and the children have been finding a quarter of amounts. In English, we are writing nonchronological reports and the children have been gathering facts ready to create their own information books. In science, we went outside to explore micro-

habitats. The children were able to describe why some animals prefer certain habitats. In geography, Miss McDonald helped us explore the continent of North America and the children learned how diverse the culture is in different countries. Well done to all of the children in Year 2 who represented our school in a Matball competition this week. We are all proud of your great efforts.

<u>Year 3</u>

The children have worked very hard this week and we are very proud of them, as always. In maths, we have been multiplying a 2-digit number by three, four or five, with and without regrouping. We have written non-chronological reports about Italy in our English lessons. As part of the Liverpool Children's Festival of Reading, we enjoyed participating in an online author session with Kimba and listened to his poems. Children are really enjoying their new topics: in science 'Light' and 'Europe' in geography. Well done to the children who represented our school in 'Young Voices.' We look forward to parent meetings next week, there are few parents who have still not made appointments through 'School Cloud'. Please do so as soon as possible.

<u>Year 4</u>

Year 4 have had an extremely busy week. During our English lessons, the children have identified the qualities of a well-written play script. In maths, the children have continued to amaze us with their knowledge of fractions. This week they have added and subtracted fractions greater than one. Also, Year 4 had a very enjoyable singing lesson on Thursday as we continue to practice songs from Joseph the musical. We have started our new R.E topic of 'Eucharist' this week, beginning with a whole class discussion on the significance of a First Holy Communion. In science, the children have continued to discover more about animals and their habitats, identifying which habitat is most suited to each animal class.

PE AT ST AMBROSE

We are close to finishing our first topics of 2023 and we've seen some amazing development from every class! Years I and 2 have shown super skills in their send and return topic. Year 3 and 4 have focused on skills to help them succeed in dodgeball. Year 5 used different shot types in tennis and Year 6 have been working on hockey set-piece skills!

<u>Year 5</u>

In English, we continued our amazing work on 'Varjak Paw'. We wrote diary entries from the perspectives of Varjak and Holly, as they went to the city in search of a dog. This half term, we have been focusing on the vocabulary that we use in our writing and it's safe to say that Y5 absolutely knocked this piece of writing out of the park! In science, we completed several investigations into the different properties of materials. First, we tested the best material to use for a teapot. Then, as we studied magnetism, we investigated which objects around our classroom were magnetic. On Thursday, as part of Liverpool Children's Reading Festival, we took part in a live stream with poet 'Kimba'. We absolutely loved it!

<u>Year 6</u>

We have had another busy week in Year 6. We have continued our journey with Naledi and Tiro in 'Journey to Jo'burg' and have written formal letters expressing concerns about discrimination in South Africa. As part of Liverpool Reading Festival, we joined author Polly Ho-Yen, in a live stream, as she told us about her inspiration for writing and the characters in her books. In maths, we have been translating and reflecting shapes across all four quadrants, consolidating our learning by identifying missing coordinates. In science, we compared how a

polar bear and a camel have adapted to very different habitats. On Friday, we participated in a live stream with Spaceport, based in the Shetland Islands. Have a great weekend!
